Durham University Support Progression Programme

The Supported Progression is a scheme for talented students studying in the North East and Cumbria who have the potential to study at a university like Durham and who will benefit from additional help and support to reach their full potential. 18 of our Gifted & Talented Year 10 students initially displayed an interest in participating in this scheme and after completing eligibility forms, 6

students were selected by the university to produce formal

applications.

This application process involved giving information about the higher education history of their parents, outlining their predicted GCSE grades and creating a personal statement to explain why they would benefit from the scheme and what characteristics they could offer. A teacher reference was also included from the school about each pupil and based on all these parameters, Annie Bowe, Joseph Jackson, Emily Lowes and Michael O'Connor were all offered one of the 170 places on the programme.

They will now be involved in two residentials between April and August where the pupils will enhance their subject knowledge, gain valuable study skills and develop key personal skills including confidence, communication, teamwork and presentation skills. The Year 10 pupils will also get the chance to meet and work with students currently studying at Durham University. They will experience, first hand, what living at university is like and benefit from information, advice and guidance to support their future plans and aspirations.

An Ogden Trust Physics Master Class comes to NTS Mr Brockbank



On Thursday 29th November, 100 Lower Sixth Physics students from NTS, Caldew, Trinity, William Howard, QEGS and Appleby gathered in the J Hall after school to hear Dr Harald Fox of Lancaster University speak on the Standard Model of Particle Physics and explain the Higgs Boson to the students. Afterwards, we retreated to the labs to be shown the normally invisible paths of alpha radioactivity in cloud chambers specially constructed for the occasion. The school has been allowed to keep two of the cloud chambers. We were also gifted the remains of the dry ice so that the experiment could be shown to as many classes as possible the next day. The event was very well received and inspired our students. I was grateful for the support of members of the Science department who gave up their time to help direct people round the school. A notable first was the presence of the Head Teacher of the host school at an Ogden Trust event, and I am very appreciative of the support.

The Debating Society will continue to fly the Nelson Thomlinson flag next term as they contest places in the newly minted Carlisle Consortium competition.



During a School Council meeting at the start of the year his nephew, Jack Story (Year 11), requested if any charity efforts could be directed to the

Royal Dragoon Guards Association. They have provided invaluable support for Bob's family, including financial support since Bob's death. The council members were touched by Jack's speech and agreed that the proceeds of the Founders' Day collection should go to the Association. On Founders' Day £500 was raised, however, Jack requested if he could undertake further fundraising both in school and at Innovia and he successfully raised another £500.

Year 9 Inter-Form Rugby League Competition Tournament Review

All eight Year 9 forms participated in the 2012 tournament and this year's theme was the NRL, the Australian competition. This year was undoubtedly the most evenly matched affair with the majority of the games being hard-fought encounters.

In the first round matches Wests Tigers (9NM) were narrowly defeated by reigning champions, 9HS whose adopted team this year was the Penrith Panthers. They edged past the Tigers 16-8 with Holyoak grabbing a hat-trick for the victors and Beaty adding another. The Tigers replied via tries from Warwick and Sloan. South Sydney (9EH) crushed the Gold Coast Titans

(9HW) 28-4. However, this did not reflect the grit and determination shown by HW. 9EH's tries came from Neaves, Green, Thomlinson, Osborne, Christie and a brace from Proudfoot. 9HW could only muster a lone try from Shaw in reply. The third 1st round match saw the New Zealand Warriors (9VB) down St George-Illawarra (9JW) by 24-0. The Warriors scored at will and the rugged Parker led the way with a brace, as did Barton. Allison and Nichol wrapped up the scoring. The final game in this round saw Sydney Roosters (9JP) edge an extremely tight game with the Manly Sea Eagles (9RS), 20-16. Pattinson led the way for 9JP with four tries and was ably supported by Bewley who added the other try. 9RS were unlucky to lose this game as they scored four tries of their own through an Oldham hat-trick and a spectacular effort by Thwaite.

The semi-finals saw some superb rugby league. 9HS just overcame a very stubborn 9EH side by 8-4. That man, Holyoak scored as did Millican. Proudfoot replied for 9EH but they just fell short. In the other semi-final, 9JP's power was the decisive factor as they vanquished 9VB. It was the Pattinson and Bewley show once again as Robbie chipped in with another four tries and Mike with two. In reply, 9VB registered tries through Barton, with a wonderful solo effort and from Nichol and Parker. Parker was perhaps one of the most iconic players of the tournament running strongly with the ball while at the same time, his golden locks flowing in the wind.

A large partisan crowd gathered in the hope that 9JP could end 9HS's two-year winning streak. 90% of the spectators were cheering for the Roosters and the opening exchanges were keenly contested. The final saw a contrast of playing styles; 9JP playing a powerful, forward dominated game with 9HS preferring an expansive style of rugby. The scores were locked-up at 20 all after the end of normal time. Extra-time was then played and it was 9HS who scored to break the hearts of 9JP's fans and players. 9HS showed why they are a champion side; they play right until the final whistle and their self-belief means that they are always confident of victory. Holyoak was the main threat for 9HS and scored four tries and Beaty and Kemp added one each. For the losers, Pattinson added another four try haul and Bewley another to give a final score (after extra time) of 24-20

Mr Hamilton presented the new trophy to the winning captain and the man of the match, was awarded to Mike Bewley of 9JP for his excellent performance in both defence and attack, despite being on the losing team.
